The Institute of Hungarian Studies (IHS) is pleased to announce the first annual Louis Horvath Scholarship Program in Hungarian Studies. Through the generous support of the Louis Horvath Endowment, the IHS offers \$2000 travel and research fellowships to support outstanding Rutgers undergraduates who want to pursue an independent research project in any aspect of Hungarian studies.

Guidelines

- Horvath Fellowships may be used to pursue individual projects in Hungarian Studies in many different ways including: a Study Abroad program in Hungary, or travel (to Hungary and/or to countries with Hungarian communities outside Hungary), research and living expenses while abroad, and tuition for Hungarian language programs or other kinds of study abroad programs in Hungary
- Awards will be made on a competitive basis, and will be granted based on the quality of the applicant and the careful and thoughtful description of the project.
- Applicants must be enrolled in the B.A. program at Rutgers University. Students enrolled in M.A. and Ph.D. programs are not eligible.
- Projects must have something to do with Hungarian politics, history, society, culture, or must otherwise show a need for the student to carry out a project in Hungary.
- Project should be completed by December 31, 2013.

Applications

Applicants must submit:

- A two page project description explaining what the student proposes to do and why.
- A curriculum vitae
- 2 letters of recommendation

The deadline for submissions is March 15, 2013. Awards will be made by April 1, 2013.
