

Shakespeare wrote plays to be performed, not read silently like novels. This summer course, open to students at Rutgers and other universities, spends two weeks discussing Shakespearean drama at Rutgers, and then moves to England to see plays performed on the stages of the Royal Shakespeare Company in Stratford-upon-Avon (Shakespeare's Birthplace) and at the Globe Theatre and other London venues. In Stratford and in London, we explore major sites associated with Shakespeare and his contemporaries (among other major landmarks), and study with actors, directors, and scholars associated with the major centers for Shakespearean studies and performance. In the process, we explore London and other parts of England.

General

- **3-credit course** in four intensive weeks; counts for credit toward the major.
- > Travel essentials include a passport and a notebook for taking notes each day.
- Accommodations in Stratford provided in local Bed-and-Breakfast; in London at a University residence hall two blocks from the Thames and the theater.

Course Requirements

- ➤ Attendance, punctuality, attentiveness, and participation.
- ➤ Three 2-page reviews for staged performances.
- ➤ One longer paper, begun in the first week of the course.
